Session I: Common Approaches to Strengthen the Non-Proliferation Treaty

Leading up to the international summit on non-proliferation and arms control hosted by the government of the United States in Washington DC and the Review Conference of the Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) in New York, political decision makers and experts from Japan and Germany aim at discussing common strategies and approaches to secure the continuation and to achieve the strengthening of the global non-proliferation regime.
